Education is the key to success. But what if the key does not open the door because the recipient of that key is unwilling to use it?

I read that out loud to my 10-year-old daughter, and it was a lot to comprehend, so I'm going to assume some of you might not understand what I mean either.

You can give people the tools and the opportunities that will potentially set them up for success. The operative word is "potentially." No matter what you do for someone, if they don't use what they've been given, or take advantage of the opportunities afforded to them, there is nothing you can do. You are not in control of what others are doing with what you've taught them or invested into them.

The subject of my column is based on my 12-year-old son, who actually told me to write about him going back to public school. For many reasons (maybe excuses as well), he struggled to be motivated to learn and lacked the self-discipline to complete assignments in class and at home. His teachers, guidance counselor, and myself, tried to strategize and inspire him. There was nothing left for us to do but hope that he would motivate himself and put in the work.

I pulled him out of public school and chose an online academy, and I also supplemented with my own homeschool curriculum. Being away from friends, and having a full-time working mom/homeschool teacher, took a toll on him. He eventually fell into old habits and couldn't climb out of his lack of motivation. So, back to public school!

I know there is hope for his future. The education and how he receives it is not what matters. What matters are the habits and discipline that must be developed. I said it at the beginning of his middle school journey: "I don't care how you learn, as long as you do."

Individuals learn at their own pace, in their own way, and have their own strengths and weaknesses. Not every student will master the art of writing a research paper. Not every student will find the value in learning how to measure angles. Students will not use everything they learn in their future, but they are expected to earn high marks on subjects that do not matter to them.

Encouraging kids to be motivated and disciplined, to be respectful and a team player, are the basic skills that come from going to school and learning. Those skills are transferrable to real life and career. Exercising their minds by using a variety of subjects sounds good, but not every student wants to learn a variety of subjects, so they "workout" less in those subject areas.

Not one person in this world is exempt from doing things we do not want to do. There are options, but then there are also requirements.

That is actually what schools are teaching. So, if you are like me and are challenged by an intelligent kid who simply lacks the inspiration to learn things that seem irrelevant at this time, remember that every person is different. Show a lot of grace, do not let up on consequences and discipline, and keep in mind that your child can still become a successful adult.

Most of the school subjects will always be irrelevant to your child's life, but what will be most pertinent are his or her work ethic, motivation to complete what he or she started, and self-confidence. That is the bigger picture.

### COULDA, SHOULDA, WOULDA



Tao'y mabubuhay ng pantay pantay!





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
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
