My daughter's elementary school recently practiced their routine ALICE (Active, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate) drill. When I asked her about it, she explained what her class and teacher had to do. I asked her why she had to hide, and who she was practicing hiding from, and she made gun signs with her hands. I asked her if she's heard of someone breaking into a school with a weapon, and she said, "Yes, in Texas."

In no way did she exhibit fear or concern. I admired her for her strength, and also felt so grateful that her teachers have made her feel safe. However, not everyone can exercise that same calm feeling. Anxiety is real. There are parents, teachers, other school employees, students and many others, who are crippled with fear. I feel for any of you who are mentally drained and physically exhausted from the news.

I didn't want to be the writer of yet another article related to what occurred at Robb Elementary. However, I also don't want another mass shooting to yet again occur.

What can we do, as people who live and work and send our children to school, here in the United States? How can we mobilize for change so that the security of our educational facilities are adequate enough to stop the violence? Does anyone — from any political party or any side of the gun law argument — really have an answer? Because I'm not sure. I hear more problems than solutions because no one can seem to ever agree on what is best.

Is increasing security in the schools' budgets?

Can money be allocated from the states to the schools for this reason?

What matters more to the bottom line?

Will our taxes be raised?

Will schools in lower-income areas even have the chance to add a higher level of security? Is this a mental health issue or a gun policy issue?

I grew up in the 90s. I grew up with mass school shootings seemingly the norm, or least more common than not. My kids practice ALICE drills as casually as fire drills.

There needs to be more action and less arguing, and this goes beyond gun laws and school safety. Our country has become a competition between political parties, rather than a collection of united states. Who's going to continue to pay for this?




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
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
