Member Spotlight - Pearl Hann

Hello, my name is Pearl Tamargo Hann, and I'm a returning member of FCDC. I was born in Clara Maass Medical Center in Belleville, and I'm originally from Lake Hiawatha. I grew up on the Jersey shore since 1987, attended all Ocean County schools, and currently reside in my husband's hometown of Toms River, with our two female German shepherds, Reina and Summer. My husband, Philip Hann, is employed by the Toms River Public Works Department and retired from the Toms River Fire Department. I am a banker at Flagstar Bank.

My mother played a huge part in where my family resided. She immigrated to New Jersey in 1969 because of someone she knew, and my parents chose Howell because of its rural area, which was what they were used to in Ilocos Sur. My sister and I grew up with my aunt and her family, who resided in Belleville, and over the years, my parents' sisters and their families joined us. I'm forever grateful to my parents for teaching me to enjoy the simple things in life.



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My parents raised me and my sister with tremendous family values: kindness, patience, foresight, empathy, respect, endurance, honesty, accountability, and forgiveness. We were taught the traditional Filipino value of respecting our elders, even if that person was only older than us by a day. Family before you, family before all, treat everyone like family, was how I was brought up. To this day, I'm close to my family. I grew up with two-hour dinners with my parents, grandmother, and sister, not only a form of therapy and bonding but of educational debates with my father. Church was every Sunday morning with Christmas Eve mass at 12:00 am at Saint Mary of the Lake Church in Lakewood, and then the family gathering afterward. Many of the traditions of my parents taught me have carried well into my family life now, wherein we're altogether or nothing at all.



As the daughter of Filipino immigrants from Ilocos Sur, growing up on the Jersey Shore as part of a bilingual /crosscultural/ multigenerational household, I felt that my upbringing was different than mostly those of the other children I grew up with. I was embraced by my friends and neighbors and misunderstood and bullied by those ignorant of how small Asian girls are, as I am barely 5 feet tall. I've always stood out because of being tiny until people start conversing with me and realize that I'm not a child now that I'm older.

I returned to FCDC and posted much about the Filipino history and culture on my social media due to the racism we endured during the pandemic, like most other Asians, to express my support for us and my belief in this organization. I love the fundraisers FCDC does to give back to the community, coordination with Simbang Gabi, and other charitable events to uplift the less fortunate. I hope this organization's around forever and will continue to be led with such dedication by its amazing leaders.

May your blessings rain down upon you always and keep the family together!
