

FCDC extends our special gratitude to Fr. Michael Kennedy, pastor of St. Luke's Church for gracing the event.



Thank you to our amazing FCDC youth for teaching our community.



My Experience at Santacruzan by Zachary Lichter

The members of the Filipino-American Community and Development Center (F.C.D.C.) celebrated Santacruzan on May 18, 2024.

What is Santacruzan? It is a celebration of the Holy Cross, which was discovered by St. Helena and her son, Constantine, who became the first Christian emperor of Rome. Santacruzan usually takes place in the month of May because it is the month of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The tradition of Santacruzan involves a procession on the street followed by a mass at the end. Toward the end of the procession, the participants are handed a red or white rose that they will place by the Statue of Mary inside the church. Filipinos observe this tradition by having girls wear filipinianas and by boys wearing barongs.

The characters of Santacruzan this year included Methuselah, played by Jomar Batallones. The Reynas are a representation of Mary, and the Reynas for this year's Santacruzan included Reyna Banderada (Queen with a banner), Reyna Fe (Queen of faith), Reyna Esperanza (Queen of Hope), Reyna Caridad (Queen of Charity), Reyna Abogada (Queen and defender of the poor and oppressed), Reyna Sentenciada (Queen of the Convicted), Reyna Esther (Queen Esther), Reyna Sheba (Queen of Sheba), Reyna delas Estrellas (Queen of the Stars), Reyna Paz (Queen of Peace), Reyna delas Propetas (Queen of the Prophets), Reyna del Cielo (Queen of Heaven), Reyna delas Virgines (Queen of the Virgins), Reyna delas Flores (Queen of Flowers), Reyna delos Angeles (Queen of Angels), and Reyna Candelaria (Queen of Candles).

A boy wearing a barong escorted each girl who played a Reyna. The other characters included Samaritana (Female Samaritan), played by Patricia Belocura, and St. Veronica, played by Kateri Alberto. The representations of Mary included Mary of Magdala (Mary Magdalene), played by Gillian Alcid; Mary, Mother of Christ, played by Lucy Alberto; and Ramila Rose Lim, played Mary, Mother of James. The Divina Pastora (Divine Shepherdess) was played by Gigi Satterfield and Hannah Arabiana. played Rosa Mystica (Mystical Rose). Eight angels carried a letter spelling the word "Ave Maria." Jayden Chong was Reyna Elena (Queen Elena) and Lorenzo Salud was Constantine. This year's Santacruzan was at St. Luke's in Toms River. The participants met in the event room, where they all assembled. I was an escort for Reyna delas Virgines, played by Therese Alberto. Esther Tambor, Mae Alberto, Lorna Tejada, Lorna Alfaro, and Arlene Tan all prayed a decade of the Rosary.

Since it was raining, we processed inside St. Luke's. The procession began in the event room, went down the hallway, and concluded by the altar in the church. After the procession, F.C.D.C. joined the parishioners of St. Luke's for the 4:00 Vigil Mass to celebrate Pentecost. Gregory Alcid, Joseph Payumo, and I altar served the mass with two altar servers who go to St. Luke's. The festivities concluded with a reception in the event room.

What was great about participating in Santacruzan for the second year in a row was seeing my Catholic faith and my Filipino heritage come together in one event. It's not every day that Filipino-Americans come to church dressed in their barong or filipiniana and pray to Mary. But what's great about Santacruzan is that it allows people to express their faith and culture, and parents, in particular, get to pass down their traditions to their children. What's also great about Santacruzan was that I honored my lolo, the late Dr. Rene Ynaya, by wearing his barong. My lolo was big on celebrating his culture, and he would've enjoyed watching the procession and seeing the parents pass down their traditions to the next generation.

Santacruzan is an event that celebrates what it means to be Filipino. It includes wearing traditional clothing expressing their Catholic faith, for most of them, expressing their love for the Blessed Virgin Mary, and allowing parents to pass down their traditions to the next generation.
